What is a Road Rally?

The dictionary defines a rally as a gathering of like minded people. A road rally is just that - a chance to gather with other car enthusiasts, socialize and enjoy the countryside in your car.

Our road rallies always add a bit of competition. We generally run TSD (time-speed-distance) rallies. We will give you a set of route instructions which will tell you where to turn to follow the route. We will also periodically give you a target speed that you need to AVERAGE over some distance. There will be checkpoints along the route where we will time you. We have measured the course, so we have calculated the perfect time you should arrive at each checkpoint. You receive penalty points for being early or late at the checkpoint - 1 point per 1/100 of a minute. The team with the fewest penalty points wins.

This means that a road rally is NOT a race. You get penalty points for driving too fast as well as too slow. The challenge is to average exactly the assigned speed so it is a sport of precision driving, not maximum speed. We try to find the best roads in the area. These are the roads you would seek out if you had the time to explore. They are generally twisty sports car roads and the speeds are set to provide a spirited but safe driving experience. We provide breaks during the rally and a nice gathering place at the end. This gives ample opportunities to visit with friends and share stories from the day. At the end, we will announce results and hand out trophies. We always reserve some time for special awards such as DLBF (dead last but finished) and Hard Luck because these stories are usually the best part. We would love to have you enter and be part of it.

Kettle Moraine Colors is our 4 hour Sunday afternoon rally that features only paved roads and the beautiful fall colors of the Kettle Moraine area west of Milwaukee.

The Blacke is our part daytime, part nighttime rally. It starts around 3PM on a Saturday and runs until about 9PM, so half of the rally is after dark. It features the great roads around Black River Falls in central Wisconsin, including some high quality unpaved roads.

Snowpack is our Saturday afternoon, mid-winter rally. Like Kettle Moraine Colors, it runs in the area west of Milwaukee.

Badger Burrow is our longest rally, running about 180 miles and 8 hours on a Saturday. It features brisk speeds and great roads in the driftless area west of Madison.

Roads Scholar is our Sunday afternoon, 100 mile/4 hour rally that offers the additional challenge of tricky course following. You'll be tested on your powers of reasoning and observation in addition to the challenge of staying on time.

What do I need to participate?

Our events do not need any special equipment and are designed to run on public roads in road legal vehicles.

You should bring the following to each road rally:

- A working speedometer and odometer
- Several pencils or pens
- Scratch paper
- A clipboard
- A watch that displays seconds or a smartphone that displays time of day with seconds.
- A map light if the event runs into the evening.
 The Blacke is our only rally that runs after sunset.
- A partner. Rallies require two people per car.
 One person drives and the other person navigates. The navigator typically manages the route instructions and clock.

Your car has to be road legal and insured. It is helpful to have a car with reasonable handling and performance, but our road rallies can be run in any sort of automobile. We recommend you give the car a basic safety check (horn, lights, suspension). The most common issue is a flat tire, so check the condition of the spare. Although not required, you may consider bringing the following safety equipment:

- Emergency Triangle
- First Aid Kit
- Tow Strap

Some people find a GPS unit to be helpful to see roads ahead of time. If you own a smart phone or tablet, there is a good app called the Richta Rally Odometer. This provides a good quality clock and GPS based odometer. Learn to use it ahead of time.
